TIFFANY & COHPY m

Founded by Charles L. Tiffany in 1837 with John B. Young under the name Tiffany & Young. They first stocked their store with stationery, Chinese bric-a-brac, fans, pottery, umbrellas and desks. They purchased almost all of their silverware from John C. Moore who had begun the manufacture of silverware in 1827 and who was later joined in business by his son, Edward C. Moore.

Called Tiffany, Young & Ellis in 1852. Became Tiffany & Co. in 1853.

In 1868 Tiffany was incorporated and the silverware factory of the Moores became part of the organization with Edward C. Moore becoming one of its directors. From then on, and until Mr. Moore's death the silverware made in the factory bore not only the mark "Tiffany & Co." but also the letter "M." Ever since then, both the name Tiffany & Co., and the initial of the incumbent company president appear on all Tiffanymade silver.

In 1852 Tiffany introduced the English sterling silver standard to America for Tiffany silver. This standard was later adopted by the U. S. Government and made into Federal law determining the minimum amount of fine silver required for articles marked "Sterling Silver."
