Subject: Backcountry Telephone System

Larry, I apologize for the delay; was off on a trip for a few days. Telephone has been around for a long time, before USFS was created. I don't have my refs available but I seem to recall that telephone was strung

to Warren in 1890s. Telephone was also strung to Thunder Mtn c1910. First USFS telephone that I know of was from Warren to Chamberlain RS in 1912. Telephone did not reach Big Creek area until c1924 when that area was acquired by USFS. As you and I have talked about, the backcountry phone system was the life line of the area; every mine and ranch, as well as FS stations and lookouts, had a phone justified to report fire but used for all purposes. Dan Levan's documents note that he was responsible for maintaining "over 400 miles of telephone line" in the backcountry!! I am interested in doing a paper but I am not in a position to do so for some months to come because of loss of house. At one time I had given thought to including a telephone chapter in the "Wilderness Post Offices" document that I have been working on for several years. That way the old "communication systems" can be under one cover. Pete
