The State of Idaho, pursuant to the provisions of the Act of Congress approved September 2, 1937 (50 Stat. 917), as amended, entitled "An Act to provide that the United States shall aid the States in wildlife-restoration projects, and for other purposes," and to the Rules and Regulations of the Secretary of the Interior rade and published thereunder, does hereby submit by its Idaho Fish and Game Commission, constituting the Idaho Fish and Game Department, this preliminary project statement for the wildlife-restoration project described herein, which it is proposed to carry on under the provisions of said Act and said Rules and Regulations, and for which Federal aid is requested out of the apportionments made to said State by the secretary of the Interior under the provisions of the said act.

Primitive Area Winter Range Acquisition

(South Fork, Middle Fork of Salmon to Lemhi, Custer, Idaho and Valley Chamberla

Big Creek, located within project area is bounded by the following towns:
Florence & Dixie on north; Shoup & Liyers Cove on east; Cape Horn on the south and Yellowpine & Warren on the west.

4. Needs for the proposed acquisition:

The Middle Fork of the Salmon River is one of Idaho's most important big game ranges. There is an abundance of summer range but the extent of winter range is small and the limiting factor on big game populations. Deer, elk and bighorn sheep migrate from the surrounding higher elevations into the lower, warmer and more open slopes of the Middle Fork and its tributaries for the winter. These wintering areas are those preferred by domestic livestock and any competition is sorely felt by big game animals.

Each private land holding in this area is a potential base for a grazing mit on adjoining National Forest Land or a base for a dude ranch operations k and saddle stock essential dude ranch operations are generally wintered in area because of the distance to outside range.

At the present time some twelve of the twenty-three private land areas listed bases for livestock or dude ranch operations. These twelve ownerships use the winter rnage areas to the extent of some 3,089 animal months. This competitive is during the important growing season or yearlong. Animal months are figured m U.S. Forest Service grazing permits, but only includes the "Idaho primative a." Where Salmon River marks the boundary of primative area, ramches on opposite e of river are not included in this listing.

Some value will accrue to fishing. The value of public ownership to trout teams cannot be over-emphasized. There is likewise another value involved that all be considered. Each private land area in this back country is the potential of for nuisance operations and game, fur and fish poaching.

Planned administration of project area:

- (a) Area will be opened to hunting according to management policies of Idaho Fish and Game Commission. It is necessary to harvest game to keep population within carrying capacity of winter range.
- (b) Headquarter sites will be established for summer and winter patrol.

 (Will be adjacent to landing fields where operation of flown hunters can be observed.)
- (c) No other use will be made of the lands other than for game propagation.

Wildlife restoration developments planmed:

Willow and browse should be planted along bars to eventually supplement sting browse.

The attached map shows the location of the private land holdings and the cached tabulation gives location and acreage of each unit. There may be a few litional private land holdings revealed through further research into land tus record.

Most of this land is grazing land with a few artificial readows on the river

c) Trapping:

Trapping of some fur bearing animals de engaged in annually-beaver, mink, muskrats end marten are the few animals found in the area. State trappers and tives have, at various times, trapped and hunted coyotes, cougar and bob cats are all fairly common in the area.

d) Hunting:

Hunting above Camas Creek is composed mostly of deer hunting; however, elk are taken. Below Camas Creek, deer, elk, big horns and litn. goat may be. This area in past years had permitted hunters to take two deer. However, ional deer removal was not accomplished and a straight "one deer permitted" was ad. The season in this area has been from 67 to 57 days. In 1946 had 57 days—I deer removal was 700 to 1,000.

Considerable value is placed upon this property as sites for private hunting and and lodges. McCall Ranch sold last year for \$45,000.00 and was only 80 acres. er, it did have a nice lodge and small sawmill on property.

Timber:

Most of privately owned land is adjacent to river and does not carry heavy stands mber. All existing itends are virgin except for limited amount taken for cabin ruction, or when clearings have been made for airports.

Tracts in unit:

There are 42 ownerships totaling 4,881.72 acres, with an average ownership of 5 acres.

Tract ownership:

All private ownership except for one ranch (Mitchell ranch) purchased for range under Federal Aid Project 68-L-1, in 1946.

Land rentals:

Not applicable.

Purchase possibilities:

We now have options on four ranches. Some holdings it will be impossible to ase at present, due to inflated prices paid for and asked for property. When times strike and operations change, these sites can eventually be acquired.
