It's in a nice, bound format and even comes with a poster! It shows all the types in picture form to make it easy! I've also enclosed the notice on the '86 Audubon Wildlife Report. If it's as good as the '85, it's worth the \$.

You can probably guess what the other large objects are. I finally found a bandage as big as the one you gave me when my knees were so bad. Now you have another to replace it - sorry it

took me so long. Maybe you'll need it for haying time. Or maybe I'll need one (or both!) next winter.

Hope all is goin' well back there. Say hi to Tony for me. I'll try to write him soon. The dissertation is going well, but I've given up on setting deadlines for myself. They're "estimates" now. Well, summer's just got too many other fun things to do (like the Rouge trip I'm taking next week...). Let me know about the July dates.
