The general conclussions for the project were, first, that the very strong correlation between the occurrence of house depressions and winter sheep range suggests that sheep were the economic determinent for winter residence location. Second, there is a good correlation between high elevation sites and Whitebark Pine habitat which suggests Whitebark pine nuts may have been an economic resource. Other high elevation sites were likely hunting camps. An overall conclussion is that the study area was used intermittently over long periods of time.

That looks to be about the right length. I am impressed with what your intern did with our reports!!!

Damn, I hope I can get in for a visit this summer. I will be in Hells Canyon for at least 5 weeks in July and August.
