Subject TAYLOR RANCH FACILITIES

Our bobcat research, headquartered at the Taylor Ranch, requires two people in the field during fall and winter and most of the summer. Housing for two people at the Taylor Ranch was less than ideal this past winter season. There was not room enough for Gary Koehler and his assistant in the Arlow Lewis cabin, where the only cooking facilities are located. This required occupying one end of the duplex as well as the Arlow Lewis cabin. This is not an efficient arrangement as two fires must be maintained, thus consuming twice as much fuel, and in general making living conditions more complicated, difficult and less comfortable.

I request that the present caretaker's cabin be made available to my project. Quarters there are ample for even 3 or 4 persons to live and work comfortably and efficiently. I know from years of experience that it is extremely important, particularly in winter, to have a base camp where one has "elbow room" and efficiency. There is scarcely room, literally, to turn around in the kitchen of the Arlow Lewis cabin.

I suggest that the Taylor house be made the caretaker's quarters. It sets apart from the other buildings, giving it the privacy of a home. It also has a clear view of the trailhead and the airfield, an advantage when the public visits. Further, it is likely to remain in better repair if occupied by someone who takes care of it.

I further suggest that the duplex be maintained for short-term use and for visitors. Kitchen facilities in the present outfitter's building could be utilized, assuming the University acquires those buildings.

Our bobcat research is funded for three more years, and there is a possibility we will work an additional three years. This research is a year-round effort. I have plans for research on other species in the area as well, and just yesterday discussed some of these projects with the Director of the Fish and Game Department. I want to make our efforts as efficient as possible and hope you give favorable consideration to my request.
