Experiences include 2-day hikes to the Big-horn Crags to find big-horn sheep and mountain goats and to Cold Meadows to see boreal owls and greatgray owls.

Wilderness Field Ecology

Be prepared to hike 10 miles per day in diverse weather, but also expect to observe and discuss a variety of plant communities; anadromous and nonmigratory fish species; and abundant wildlife, including golden eagles, bighorn sheep, elk, deer, coyotes and, possibly, the recently restored gray wolf. Students will be involved in an ongoing monitoring program which seeks to understand natural processes in the area. Participants should have at least an introductory course in ecology and an interest in wilderness, wildlife and wild lands.
