Here is the summary of our immobilization experience we sent to NPT and IDFG last week:

Dear Curt, Carter, Steve:

We are definitely interested in doing wolf capture and immobilization. I think It will benefit all the parties involved. We are willing to attend an immobilization refresher course. Our past immobilization training and experience is listed below.

Jim Akenson's experience and training is as follows:

As an ODFW Research Biologist, from 11/91 to 10/97:

I had sole responsibility for 105 cougar captures/immobilizations and 80 black bear immobilizations. I also immobilized 2 elk, and 2 deer at that time. I never experienced a fatality or significant injury with cougars. I did lose 2 bears during capture activities, one from a fall out of a tree, and another from drug reaction (respiratory failure) during the denning period. I successfully resuscitated bears (CPR-mouth to muzzle) on 2 occasions. The immobilizing drugs I used were primarily ketamine, xylazine, and telazol.

My training during those years entailed 2 immobilization classes offered by Dr. Dave Hunter with IDF&G at the Caine Veterinary Center in Caldwell. I also had 1 week of training/help in the field from Dr. Mark Omann in LaGrande to deal with immobilizing bears in the den and responding to emergency situations.

As a researcher at Taylor Ranch Field Station I immobilized 5 bighorn sheep, 7 cougars, 5 bears, and 3 bobcats.

More recently, both Holly and I attended Dr. Mark Johnson's wolf immobilization and handling course in Winchester, Idaho in 1999. We learned wolf capture techniques from Carter Niemeyer, USFWS at the same course and in the field with Isaac Babcock, Nez Perce Tribe. We also received one-on-one immobilization training in the field from Dr. Kathy Quigley, Hornocker Institute/Wildlife Conservation Society, doing cougar captures here on Big Creek. During our Hornocker Institute/WCS wolf-cougar-ungulate research on Big Creek, 1999-2003, we followed the Hornocker Institute immobilization protocol, including proper storage, handling, and documentation of use of wildlife drugs. Holly and I shared immobilization responsibility during this study involving 9 cougar captures.

Holly Akenson's experience besides what is mentioned above includes participating in about 30 other wildlife immobilizations, mostly bighorn sheep in Idaho and Oregon, also black bears, cougars, 1 wolf, 1 bobcat. Holly took Dr. Dave Hunter's IDF&G wildlife capture and immobilization training and has
