We have the honor to submit herewith a report of an audit of the accounts of the Priest Lake Timber Protective Association, principal place of business, Coolin, Idaho. The State's holdings in this association represent 181,383.31 acres of timbered lands out of a total acerage of 215,598.21.

The last previous audit by this Bureau closed on December 31, 1926. This report covers the period from that date to and including November 30, 1927.

The records of the Association have been carefully kept, and standardization of accounts under the classification adopted by the Timber Protective Associations generally has been adopted and closely adhered to.

The expense of actual Fire Suppression for the season was very small, namely \$256.49. The sum of \$1,009.00 was expended on the eradication of White Pine Blister Rust in co-operation with the U. S. Government.

All cash received over the period audited, as shown by the records, has been accounted for.

The Auditing Committee of this Association for 1927 was composed of Mr. Ben E. Bush of Moscow, Idaho, and Mr. J. Jensen of Spokane. The later gentleman having resigned. Mr. Ben E. Bush and Mr. J. S. Barron, mmbers of the Auditing Committee for 1928, examined all disbursement vouchers and reported that in their opinion the amounts expended were necessary and proper to protect holdings in this association; and that the prices paid for supplies and the rates paid for labor were in accord with prevailing prices and wages.

AUDITORS' CERTIFICATE

We hereby certify that we have audited the accounts of the Priest Lake Timber Protective Association for the season 1927, beginning December 31. 1926 and ending November 30, 1927. All funds of this association were deposited in the Bonner County National Bank, Sandpoint, Idaho, and disbursed by voucher checks and time checks signed by proper authority.

The expense vouchers and pay rolls were examined by the Auditing Committee, which reported that all expenditures appeared to be necessary and essential to the prevention and suppression of forest fires. FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

1927

The 1927 fire season was one of the most favorable ever experienced in this locality. Only ten fires were handled by the Association, the largest of which was 1.6 acres. An unusually large number of lightning storms occurred but either missed the Association area or were followed by heavy showers and started few fires that could be detected afterwards.

The ground cover never dried out to the extreme danger point after the heavy spring and early summer rains. The season practically ended with the general rain of August 31.

The fire in Section 35, T. 62, R. 4 was a hold over from spring brush burning. It does not seem reasonable that spring burning should not be practiced but the danger of such fires occurring must be recognized and every possible precaution taken to prevent their doing any damage. The smokers' fire on July 27 in Section 1. T. 57, R. 4 was undoubtedly due to the carelessness of an employee of a timber operator. Sufficient evidence was not available to start any legal action. The man who was probably responsible maintained that the fire must have started from the back fire of a tractor, which, however, is not at all probable.

Compliance with the Forestry Law

All of the operators made a conscientious effort to dispose of their logging slash and some real progress was made in compliance with the Idaho State law. On a State Sale area on Caribou Creek there has been done some very good and some poor piling, but as a rule, the operator has not piled very far beyond the roads and more accessible areas and has as yet done but very little burning. Approximately 30 acres of brush were burned on Caribou this fall. With the favorable season for fall burning, good progress was generally made by operators on the State Forest.

Publicity

A motion picture campaign was carried on during April by the Forest Service employees and it it believed much good will result if followed up with other programs as opportunities come.up. This was somewhat of an enlargement upon the slide and lecture programs put on in the past and was more in the line of educational entertainment. The usual America Forest Week activities were carried on and it was apparent that more interest was taken by the towns than was formerly the case. The seriousness of the situation was probably brought home to them by the disasterous 1926 season.

Improvement-Maintenance

The maintenance work on both trail and telephone lines was completed early in the season and with the favorable weather conditions it was possible to improve some bad places on the more important trails. The East Shore Telephone line was reconstructed and put in first class shape from Coolin to the edge of the Bear Creek burn. This work would have been carried farther but the bad weather made it impractical.

Improvement Construction

The Two-Mouth cabin was completed. The work required on the building was some finishing, painting and screening of the porch.

Two miles of new trail were constructed on Two-Mouth Creek. This work was especially difficult since all the flats along the creek are swampy and require a number of bridges and if the side hill is resorted to much solid rock is encountered. About 3 miles of this trail yet remain to be built to reach the headwaters of the drainage.

One and one-half mile of trail was partially completed on Lookout Mt. in order to place the protection camp on top of the Peak next season. Additional work will be necessary but it can be largely accomplished by contributed time of the protection men.

On the South Fork of Indian Creek 3 miles of trail were constructed and 2 additional miles will now complete this project.

Approximately 5 miles of trail were constructed on the North Fork of East River with 2 miles remaining to be completed.

Proposed Improvement Projects

The following construction projects are specifically recommended for the 1928 season:

This fall approximately 20 thousand feet of logs were cut and are now stored at Coolin in connection with a Forest Service logging operation. It is planned to cut these logs into lumber during the winter or early spring and this will provide the rough lumber necessary for the buildings and wharves.

Protection Organization

The protection organization was the same as lined up in the budget. In addition, during the critical part of the fire season, 12 men were employed on trail and other improvement work. The Phoebe Tip fireman was put in and supplied form the Pend Oreille side, which is not a satisfactory arrangement but was the only thing that could be done. since there was no trail or telephone line from the Priest Lake side.

If the Association men are to benefit by the advance training given all Forest Service men it will be nectssary to advance the opening date for all men to June 11. This season the opening date was July 1 for 2 men, June 21 for 3 men, June 16 for 6 men and June 11 for 6 men. This increase would be equal to 1 man for 3 months. Such training is not absolutely necessary but it is highly desirable for in no other work are men of the same quality placed on their own responsibility to the extent that they are in the fire protection game.

Equipment

Five mules and 3 horses are now owned by the Association. Two horses were condemned and killed because of their old age; one horse was crippled and had to be killed; 2 mules were accidently killed, one of which was being used on Forest Service planting work. A damage claim in the amount of \$80.00 has been made and payment will probably be made in time to purchase another one next spring.

It was found that the fire administrative equipment was badly run down at the beginning of the season and for that reason it was necessary to make rather heavy expenditures for equipment of various kinds. Considerable equipment is still needed, including an outboard motor and two 18 foot boats.

The motor launch and the rowboat at Coolin are of no further value and should be disposed of by sale if a buyer can be found, or destroyed to make room for other boats. It is not considered advisable to purchase another launch since the Forest Service "Firefly" and the small boats can handle any ordinary traffic. Furthermore, only one boatman can be financed and one or the other boats would be idle at all times except whe fires were burning and an emergency boatman could be employed. The commercial rates for freighting on the lake are very reasonable and with the "Firefly" available to afford competition as a means of keeping them so, it is not believed that the Association can afford to purchase a new boat when other equipment and improvements are so urgently needed.

FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

1928

The 1928 fire season was a continuation of the favorable 1927 season. But ten fires occurred, the largest of which covered one acre. The only near serious situation occured on Aug. 24 when a severe electric storm struck the lower and drier portion of the Association territory. Six fires were set at this time but with the patrol force available they were quickly put out after discovery and did little damage. All of the season's fires were caused by lightning.

The season did not break with general rains until Oct. 1, September being the driest month of the year. No brush burning was done during this dry period and with the danger of lightning storms past no trouble was experienced.

Brush Disposal

Cutting has been completed on the State Sale of Dec. 20, 1924, on Caribou Creek and practically all of the brush piled. Burning has been in progress more or less regularly since October 1 and we were informed by the operator on November 23 that the burning was completed and that he considered the work finished.

Good progress has been made by the same operator in disposing of the 120 acres of slash near Coolin and it could easily have been completed had more men been employed during the facorable burning weather. The operator realizes his responsibility in the matter and it is believed that he will satisfactorily complete the work this fall or early next spring.

The slash on the State Sale area on Big Creek is handled under a cooperative arrangement with the Forest Service. The brush from last winter's operations has been piled but not burned on account of the dry conditions which continued so late on the exposed slopes.

The three areas are the only ones within the Association on which there are slash accumulations to be disposed of.

Publicity

The usual American Forest Week activities were carried on in connection with the Forest Service. It is believed that some favorable reaction must have resulted from this work in as much as no mancaused fires occured during the dry fall season when land clearing is usually being done.

Improvement Maintenance

All trails and telephone lines were repaired before the opening of the fire season and in many instances were improved beyond their present standards. Several of the older trails were bettered by corduroying bad mud holes and changing other bad places. There is still further opportunities for improvement along these lines.

Improvement Construction

A fireman's cabin was started at Indian Creek and is about 75% completed.

Wharves were constructed at Indian Creek and Two Mouth Creek. These were much needed improvements at these points.

Five miles of the Phoebe Tip telephone line was completed and the material is on the ground for the remaining four miles.

4.5 miles of trail were constructed on Two Mouth Creek and this trail is now completed. The trail to the Lookout Mountain Lookout which was reported last year as being partially completed was finished during the past season. Two miles were added to the South Fork of Indian Creek trail and this project is now complete.

One mile of trail was put in as a connecting link between the North and South Forks of Hunt Creek trails. About one mile remains to be completed.

Approximately 2.5 miles of trail were constructed on the North Fork of East River which completes the trail in this drainage.

A trail up Trapper Creek to Phoebe Tip was projected for the season but after a small amount of work had been done it was necessary to abandon it on account of a shortage of available funds.

A log cabin was constructed at White Tail Butte Lookout largely on time contributed by the protection men.

Proposed Improvement Projects

The following construction projects are recommended for the 1929 season:

A sufficient amount of lumber is on hand to carry on the proposed building program, having been cut from the logs on hand as reported last year.

Protection Organization

The entire organization as provided for in the budget was placed in the field at the beginning of the season and carried until it was apparent that the peak of the season was past. Some reductions were then made in order to effect savings and keep within the funds available which were somewhat less than those provided for in the budget.

Equipment

Three horses were purchased during the season. One mule was accidently drowned in the Thorofare and old horse was disposed of this fall. The Association now owns 4 mules and 5 horses. It will be necessary to purchase 3 additional head of stock next spring. The \$80.00 damage claim against the Forest Service for a mule killed in 1927 has recently been paid.

The Honeymoon launch together with an old Evinrude motor and row boat were sold during the summer. Two steel boats were purchased and also Johnson motors for each. This provides transportation for any ordinary traffic at Coolin, but an additional boat and motor is needed at Beaver Creek.

Considerable administrative and improvement equipment was purchased but there is still a need for a quantity of some items, blankets in particular.
