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YOUR FARMHOUSE— PLAN IT TO FIT YOUR NEEDS

REGARDLESS OF WHETHER your farmhouse is to be newly constructed or remodeled, one fact is definite—It will be a better house if you plan it.

EACH FARM IS DIFFERENT so we have difficulty in setting a definite list of rules for planning the farmhouse. However, all our farms are similar enough so that we can follow certain fundamental principles.

THE IDEAL FARMHOUSE design takes into consideration the farm, other buildings, yards, the highway, the wind, water supply, slope of the land, the sun, nature of the soil, and the size, needs, and likes of the family.

PLAN ONE PART of your house at a time and in the proper order. You are working backwards if you plan your house before you know WHERE and HOW you will place it.

Locate the House RIGHT You Will Live There A Long Time.



Place the house between the barn area and the road.

The house can go on either side of the drive.

Locate the house on a higher level than the drive if slope, wind direction, and view permit.

Instal on a view of the barn area and the driveway from the kitchen and workroom.

Plan the Room Arrangements

Good planning means more convenience—less work—fewer wasted motions.



Plan a workroom near the kitchen.

Locate the workroom between the barn area and the kitchen.

Have a washroom-restroom near the rear door, the workroom, and the kitchen.

> Insist on a view of the barn area and the driveway from the kitchen and workroom.



- Plan a breakfast nook and a dining room near the kitchen.
 - Plan the living room nearest to the road and facing the best view.

Three bedrooms are not too many.

Locate the bedrooms in the quieter part of the house.



Build the bathroom close to the bedrooms. A home needs a central hall leading to all rooms. Plan the basement for your furnace and for storage.



Provide a parking area for your guests.

Three Features That Make A Farmhouse Different—

- 1. MAKE THE FRONT DOOR FACE THE DRIVE so visitors will come to the front door.
- 2. PLAN A CENTRAL HALL that reaches all rooms, including stairs to the basement and second floor. Plan to enter the hall from the rear door.
- 3. A WORK ROOM makes easier such jobs as laundering, meat cutting, soapmaking, and many other such tasks. It provides an excellent place for men to slip off muddy boots or dirty coveralls. Plan the workroom for the first floor near the kitchen. Someone will use the room almost every hour of the day.

YOU MAY NOT BE ABLE TO INCLUDE ALL THESE IDEAS IN ONE PLAN. INCLUDE AS MANY AS POSSIBLE. THE MORE YOU CAN WORK IN, THE BETTER YOUR PLAN WILL BE FOR FARM USE. **Good Results Come From Careful Planning**
