The training and education of Idaho citizens for civil defense is a cooperative function of the following state agencies and organizations:

**Department of Education**  
**Department of Health**  
**American National Red Cross**

Following is a brief description of each training opportunity. A schedule of offerings from July 1, 1966, to June 30, 1967, is included for those programs offering a formal course of instruction. To the end that **you** may survive any disaster, natural or nuclear, these programs are directed.

## **Rural Civil Defense**

The Agricultural Extension Service conducts a program of civil defense training and information for the rural public. This includes people residing in rural areas, and federal, county and municipal leaders in the rural community. The program is directed toward preparing the public to survive natural or nuclear disaster and to preparing agricultural officials and leaders to meet their responsibilities in a disaster. Rural civil defense training and information is incorporated into the on-going Extension program. This is a responsibility of the county Extension staff with leadership and assistance provided by the state specialist staff. The primary contact for the rural civil defense program is the county Extension office.

## Governor's Civil Defense Conference

A one-day state-wide conference for officials of state and federal government agencies, designed to develop a common understanding of the planning and functioning of government agencies to provide an effective civil defense in Idaho, covers the revised state plan.

## Medical Self-help

Medical self-help is designed to help prepare people for survival if disaster strikes and there is no professional medical assistance available. The medical self-help program consists of sixteen hours of instruction, divided into eleven separate lessons. It includes simple medical techniques and procedures not covered in existing first aid courses.

During the fiscal year 1966-67 the medical self-help program will be emphasized and promoted in the areas surrounding the following cities:

## Family Survival Instructor

A fifteen-hour course of instruction designed to prepare local qualified teachers to develop, promote and conduct personal family survival courses for the public. One course will be scheduled in each of the state highway districts. The highway district headquarters are as follows:

## Family Survival

A twelve-hour course to prepare the general public for disaster survival. Primarily directed toward nuclear disaster, includes information to develop an understanding of civil defense basics to support local government effort. ## C. D. Management Courses

This vital thirty-hour course is primarily for all civil defense officials and other personnel having direct supervision of a segment of civil defense in government, industry, public or private institutions and the military services.

## Shelter Management Instructor

A thirty-four-hour course of instruction designed to prepare selected qualified persons to train shelter managers for fallout shelters. The course includes eighteen hours of classroom work and a sixteen-hour shelter stay. One course will be held in Boise, December 12 to 16. Course enrollment will be solicited from the entire state.



## Shelter Management Course

A sixteen-hour course of instruction to qualify selected persons to manage fallout shelters or to assist a shelter manager as a staff officer. The course includes sixteen hours of instruction, including an eight-hour shelter stay.

## Radiological Monitoring for Instructors

A thirty-hour course to train selected persons as radiological monitoring instructors. The graduates of this course will be technically qualified to train radiological monitors for fixed monitoring stations in public fallout shelters. The course also provides the necessary background for advanced training as radiological defense officers.

## **Radiological Defense Officer**

A thirty-hour course for those who have completed the radiological monitoring for instructor's course, designed to train selected persons to evaluate, coordinate and disseminate radiological intelligence and to make appropriate emergency decisions based on this information.

## **Emergency Operations Laboratory**

Practical emergency operating center exercise for county and municipal officials to take necessary counter measures to offset the effects of nuclear disaster. Involves simulation of problems; analysis by emergency services; decisions by elected officials; and critique.
