A pre-luncheon seminar entitled "Improving Your Quality of Life" was arranged, and everyone invited. The first woman legislator in the state, Mrs. Anna Belle Clement O'Brien, agreed to speak at the luncheon.

Reservations started pouring in from Soil Conservation Service and Soil Conservation District employees and their families. We had over 100 people to attend both the seminar and luncheon with 40% male participants.

The awards portion of the program was designed to begin as a slide tape presentation set to music with a narrative. Imagine the men's surprise as the narrative started listing the many favorable traits named by the women and their faces were shown on the screen.

Especially inspiring during our program was the mention of research done for the book, <u>Breaking the Glass Ceiling</u>. In surveying top female executives, only one item had been named by everyone as helping them to achieve their goals and move up the corporate ladder - HELP FROM ABOVE! It was very encouraging to know that we in SCS-TN, too, have several in our midst who strive to show equality in the everyday things they do for others.
