
# NATIONAL N.O.W. PRESIDENT WILL VISIT MOSCOW

Wilma Scott Heide, president of the National Organization for Women, has accepted an invitation to speak at the Borah Symposium at the University of Idaho April 2-4. Her name was placed in nomination by members of the Women's Caucus. She will approach the topic, "Power as a Cause of War and a Solution to Peace", from the perspective of a feminist behavioral scientist.

While in Moscow, Ms. Heide will also meet informally with local residents interested in the women's movement. She is tentatively scheduled to appear at the Women's Center Brown Bag Series at noon on Tuesday, April 3. Please watch the staff letter, the Argonaut, and local newspapers for further details.

Ms. Heide is a former commissioner of the Pennsylvania Commission on Human Rights. She has testified before Congress on sex discrimination and has campaigned actively for passage of the Equal Rights Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. She is noted as a dynamic and devoted feminist and a witty speaker.

#### HOW TO HANDLE DISCRIMINATION

What do you do if you are refused a job or denied credit or not admitted to graduate school because of your sex? The Women's Center has a procedure set up for handling complaints of sex discrimination.

First of all, you come to the Women's Center and fill in a complaint form, which asks for a simple account of what happened. The form is then turned over to a third year law student, Linda Cook, who will contact you for more detailed information and to discuss what action to take. She also does the necessary legal research. If the act of discrimination violates state laws, the complaint may then be submitted to Liz Sullivan, the local member of the Idaho Human Rights Commission, for further action by that group.

CONSCIOUSNESS-RAISING: A PERSONAL ACCOUNT

"I have questions or something starts bothering me. I want to talk. I have to say these things to understand them myself. But since I am unsure of what I think and feel I want to talk to someone who is trying to understand and is struggling with some of the same questions herself. The consciousness-raising group last semester gave me the freedom to just blurt out whatever came to mind without feeling committed to what I said. We helped me to sort through a lot of conflicting ideas and attitudes." --- Kay Finley
