WOMEN'S CENTER NEEDS NEW LOCATION

The Women's Center will be moving again, but not before the end of this semester. It was originally assigned to Administration 109 on a temporary emergency basis, with the understanding that it would move if more space was required for central administrative offices. The President's Office will be expanding its quarters to make room for the Affirmative Action Officer and the University Attorney.

Large, easily accessible spaces are at a premium on this campus. The Women's Center has requested space in the Journalism Building, which will be vacated when the Communications Department moves into the old Agricultural Education Building.

The Women's Center has made known to the Space Allocations Committee its own peculiar needs, which are:

- 1) A space larger than the present one, to accommodate the Brown Bag crowds more comfortably.
- 2) Additional small rooms for office work, small group meetings, private conferences, and children's play.
 - 3) A location that is visible and accessible to student traffic, to keep the drop-in center functioning.
 - 4) One move only to a long-term location. An interim move, such as the one we made last year to a third floor conference room, would severely disrupt our programming.

Dr. Hartung shares our concern that the new facility be centrally located and accessible. Dr. Richardson has assured us that we will not be evicted until we have a place to go. The Space Allocations Committee has promised to make all necessary decisions before the end of this semester.

PROGRAM ON CHICANA WOMEN

Deluvina Hernandez, a Chicana activist and feminist from Los Angeles, will speak on Chicana women and the feminist movement at 2:30 p.m. on Thursday, April 18, in the Women's Center.

Ms. Hernandez, author of Mexican American Challenge to a Sacred Cow, will be on campus for the Chicano Mobile Institute and will be of the guest speakers at its evening program. For more information about the Institute, call Santiago Estrada at 885-6757.

FOCUS ON THE FEMALE HERITAGE

We changed "history" to "heritage", to include women's artistic and literary expression.

NOTIFICATION OF JOB OPENING

The Women's Center is looking for a new dinator for the 1974-75 academic year. The position is a part-time one, requiring fifteen hours a week in the Women's Center, plus coordination of a two-credit, teamtaught course called "Women's and Men's Roles in Society" for fall semester only.

Applicants must have a bachelor's degree and experience in at least one of the following areas: women's programs, counseling, coordinating, organizing, student personnel work, or administration. They must also demonstrate knowledge and understanding of past and present women's issues.

Job descriptions and application forms are available in the Office of Student Advisory Services, UCC 241. The application deadline is April 25, 1974. All applications will be reviewed by a student and staff selection committee. Those applicants who appear best qualified will be invited for interviews. Unfortunately, out-of-town applicants cannot be reimbursed for travel expenses.

WHAT ONE PERSON CAN DO . . .

The sexist and often confusing generic use of "men" has been eliminated from the University of Idaho diploma. A December graduate, Carla Maryott Parks, returned her diploma to President Hartung and requested that the phrase "Know all men that. . ." be changed. President Hartung acted immediately when the matter was brought to his attention. The spring diplomas omit the phrase entirely.

Ms. Parks contends that such words as "man", "mankind", and "men", when used to refer to the entire race, are ambiguous and tend to mar a female child's self-image. "Colleges are usually trendsetters for this sort of change. I was shocked and disappointed to find this archaic usage on my diploma," said Ms. Parks.

CENTER VOLUNTEER ON FACULTY COUNCIL

Mary O'Donnell, a junior accounting major who works in the Women's Center as a volunteer, has been elected to a one-year position on the Faculty Council.

Mary is one of the women who joined the previously all-male business student organization, Alpha Kappa Psi, thus raising the issue of sex discrimination. The local chapter's charter has been revoked by the national organization for failure to comply with membership requirements. She has also served on a university task force on the retention of female students. The task force recommended to President Hartung several new programs which would benefit women on campus. Mary is a native of Chicago and previously attended Immaculata College.
