OTHER WOMEN, OTHER LIVES: THE LEGAL AND CULTURAL STATUS OF WOMEN IN PAKISTAN. In Pakistan, in a court of law, it takes the word of two women to equal that of one man. Recent legal changes in Pakistan have worsened the status of women. Fayyaz Baqir, a Pakistani student and lecturer in the Department of Economics at the U of I, will talk about these changes as well as the influence of U.S. foreign policy on the treatment of Pakistani women.

NO LONGER ALONE. This profoundly moving film looks at the lives of battered women who seek safety and respite in shelters in the state of Washington. Produced by the Washington State Shelter Network, the film demonstrates the problems, situations, and fears faced by battered women. It is all the more striking because the film portrays the issue in our own back yard, so to speak — a reminder that women are beaten here as well as far away.

CREATIVITY IN OUR MIDST. Jeanne Leffingwell, a mixed-media artist and Moscow resident, will show slides and talk about her work as an artist. Marie Fortune from the Center for the Prevention of Sexual and Domestic Violence in Seattle will be the speaker. The following day, Tuesday, February 26, Rev. Fortune will conduct a workshop on family violence and related rural and religious issues. ATVP is very pleased to offer this opportunity to the community. Rev. Fortune has extensive experience and is well known throughout the United States for her work with these pertinent issues. The workshop is open to all who are interested. MORE ABOUT DOMESTIC VIOLENCE. Wife battering is the greatest single cause of injury to women, ranking above auto accidents, rapes or muggings. It is estimated that 6 million women will be abused by their husbands or partners this year, and some 3,000 to 4,000 will be beaten to death. A 1979 FBI report stated that 40% of all women

murdered were killed by their partners. According to a four-year study conducted at a major metropolitan hospital and completed in 1983, 25% of all women's suicide attempts were preceded by a history of battering.

WOMEN COACHES: AN ENDANGERED SPECIES? The research of Sharon Mathes, Associate Professor of Physical Education at Iowa State University, shows that women coaches are quickly becoming an endangered species even though more women participate in sports and the number of sports has increased since 1970. In 1972, 95% of girls' high school teams were coached by women; currently only 43% have women coaches. On the college level, between 1974 and 1979, there was a 139% increase in men assuming head coaching positions; during the same time, numbers of women head coaches decreased by 20%. According to Mathes, factors responsible for these statistics include the conflicts women experience with the responsibilities and expectations of marriage and family life, equal opportunity for advancement, and equal opportunity for high-status sports coaching.

HELP THE CORELLI ENSEMBLE TAKE A BITE OUT OF THE "BIG APPLE"

Some of you are familiar with the Moscow Corelli Ensemble through their performances for University and civic groups. For those who are not, the Corelli Ensemble is a string ensemble of 17 Moscow public school students ranging in age from 12 to 17. Chosen by audition on the basis of talent, technical ability, citizenship and dedication, these students have achieved excellence in musical performance and a national reputation as a result of tours to Washington, D.C., Los Angeles, and the Oregon coast.

This year the Ensemble plans to travel to New York City during spring break (March 9-17) to perform at the Manhattan School of Music and Harbor Junior High School for the Performing Arts, and to receive instruction from Masters at the New York Philharmonic Orchestra and the Juilliard School of Music.

To raise funds for their trip, the Corelli Ensemble will present a Benefit Concert in the University of Idaho Music Building Recital Hall at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, February 27. Happy Birthday, Susan B. Anthony!

Susan B. Anthony was brought up in a household of socially conscious Quakers. She attended her first Woman's Rights Convention in Syracuse, New York in 1852; before long, she was completely committed to the feminist cause.

Anthony insisted that she could neither write nor speak from a platform effectively. With a pen in her hand, she complained she felt as clumsy as if "mounted on stilts." She confided in her journal in 1860: "It is a terrible martyrdom for me to speak." Her forte was as an organizer. There was no other woman of her time who was her equal in this respect. From Stanton's memoirs comes this vivid picture of Anthony in the early days of the movement:

"(W)henever I saw that stately Quaker girl coming across my lawn, I new that some happy convocation of the sons of Adam was to be set by the ears, by one of our appeals or resolutions. The little portmanteau, stuffed with facts, was opened, and there we had...false interpretations of Bible texts, the statistics of women robbed of their property, shut out of some college, half paid for their work, the reports of some disgraceful trial; injustice enough to turn any woman's thoughts from stockings and puddings....Night after night, by an old-fashioned fireplace, we plotted and planned the coming agitation: how, when, and where each entering wedge could be driven, by which women might be recognized and their rights secured."
