She is so terrified that she runs away at once when I open the door, but she comes back to eat ravenously as soon as I disappear. Yet her hunger is clearly not only for food. I long to take her in my arms and hear her purr with relief at finding shelter. Will she ever become tame enough for that, to give in to what she longs to have? It is such an intense look with which she scans my face at the door before she runs away. It is not a pleading look, simply a huge question: 'Can I trust?' Our two gazes hang on its taut hread. I find it painful."

Wednesday Nov. 13 PANDORA'S BOTTLE: WOMEN'S HIDDEN ALCOHOLISM. A film and discussion about alcoholism, a disease affecting more than 7 million American women. Alcoholism is an incurable, progressive, genetic disease with the only proven solution being not drinking. Learn more about the little-known symptoms and dangers. If you're Irish, your chances of having the disease are one in three; American Indian, one in two; other populations, one in ten.

Tuesday Nov. 19 PORNOGRAPHY: Jan Dyer, Executive Director of the Idaho American Civil Liberties Union, and Judy Lyons, Idaho's representative to the Northwest Booksellers Association Board of Directors, will discuss issues surrounding the complexities of pornography. **Tutoring:** The Women's Center is still open on Wednesday and Thursday nights from 7-10 for study table and tutoring. Virginia Marquez offers assistance in math and algebra courses and introductory level courses in calculus and chemistry.

Women who were top high school students feel significantly worse about themselves after two years of college. According to a University of Illinois study of 36 men and 45 women, while in high school 23% of the men and 21% of the women ranked themselves as "far above average" in intelligence. By the time they were college sophomores, an almost identical percentage of the men — 22% — graded themselves as highly, while only 4% of the women felt they compared that favorably. Co-researcher Karen Arnold says women's self image worsens in college because "they're not getting the same recognition, the chance to use their skills, the (potential employers) seeking after them, the chance to try things." 
