Tuesday, Jan.28	WHITE SLAVERY IN TODAY'S WORLD: Are women still being forced into prostitution? Yes, says <b>Carol Bollinger-Sasaki</b> , Executive Director of HOME, Helping Ourselves Means Education and SAVE, Stopping Abuse Via Educa- tion. Carol will discuss white slavery in third world countries, particularly in Thailand and India where she has traveled and worked. She will share both the personal stories of the women and the violence committed against them as well as the broad problem of drawing world attention to this. Carol will remain until at least 2:00 to answer questions about HOME and SAVE.
Tuesday, Feb. 4	TAKE CHARGE: DON'T WAIT FOR A KNIGHT IN SHINING ARMOR: Am- ber Thiemens, a local Black Belt Kokondo Karate instructor, will demonstrate how to take charge in and control life-threatening, holding, and nuisance situations. Kokondo Karate is not a "sport" karate; it is strictly self defense and does not require power or strength. Theimens will also address the psy- chology of the attacker and what the person attacked can do verbally.

Feb. 5	WHERE WE'VE BEEN, WHERE WE ARE, AND WHAT WILL IT ALL MEAN: Helen Remick, University of Washington faculty member and noted national authority on comparable worth and sexual harassment, will talk about issues concerning women and the impact they have had, and will have, upon our lives and relationships with others.
