"WORLD OF LIGHT: PORTRAIT OF MAY SARTON." This film explores the life and works of poet and novelist May Sarton. Filmed primarily at her home, it examines, through interviews and readings from her work, the quality of sentiment and strength so apparent in her work, as well as some of the special dilemmas faced by women writers. A beautiful, moving film.

Wednesday Feb 4 "NO LONGER ALONE." This film about domestic violence was produced by the Washington State Shelter Network. The film asserts that domestic violence occurs in all walks of life. Six million women are abused each year and nearly 4,000 are beaten to death. This film looks at individual cases of physical, sexual and emotional abuse, and explores the feelings of both victims and abusers. The title comes from the assumption that now that there are shelters for battered women, they are no longer alone. Patti Gora, Director of Alternatives to Violence of the Palouse and Betsy Thomas, Chair of the Idaho Council on Domestic Violence will be available for discussion and questions after the showing.

Tuesday Feb 10 ALICE PAUL, AUTHOR OF THE EQUAL RIGHTS AMENDMENT: Katherine Aiken, History Professor, will talk about the life of this remarkable suffragist and feminist. Alice Paul's life is indeed a human interest story of great appeal as she fought tirelessly from 1923 to 1972 to get Congress to pass the ERA out to the states for ratification. Learn more about this fascinating woman.

Friday Feb 13 SUSAN B. ANTHONY BIRTHDAY AND VALENTINE'S DAY POT-LUCK: To continue a time-honored tradition, the Women's Center will again host a potluck. We will supply the cake, you bring the food. Come have a piece of Susan B.'s 167th birthday cake. At least once we will play the show-stopper "One Fine Day," a 5-minute music video of women in history. We will begin around noon. Come anytime.

Tuesday Feb 17 THE RAPE SHIELD LAW: WHAT IT IS, HOW DOES IT WORK? Recent publicity about a Washington state case has raised many questions about what is and what is not relevant to ask about a rape victim's past sexual history. Nancy Wolff, ex-Prosecuting Attorney of Latah County, will be here to explain the Idaho law as it is written and how it is applied locally and around the state. She will not comment on the Washington state case, since it is still in progress.

Wednesday Feb 25 WHAT IS THE LEGISLATURE UP TO THIS YEAR? Evelyn McGraw, State Vice-President of the Idaho Public Employees Association, will talk about the legislative process and about bills currently before the legislature that affect university and other public employees. She will offer tips on political strategy and lobbying techniques.

The Idaho Washington Sexual Assault Coalition has been meeting regularly over the last few months in an attempt to form an ongoing relationship among women's groups, victim advocacy groups, law enforcement and helping agencies. At the same time we are trying to provide support for a current victim of reported sexual assault. The decision was made recently to begin a defense fund which would be used to help secure legal services for current and future victims. With the current case, we believe that the integrity of the Washington State Rape Shield Law is threatened. WOMEN'S CENTER CROSS-COUNTRY SKI WEEKEND AT HUCKLEBERRY HEAVEN!!! This year's x-country ski weekend will again be at Huckleberry Heaven in Elk River, Jan. 31 - Feb. 1. We will leave Moscow mid-morning of the 31st and return the evening of the 1st. Approximate cost for meals and lodging is \$23.00 per person (this includes dinner on the 31st, breakfast and lunch on the 1st - meals account for about half of the \$23 cost).

We have reserved two apartments for the trip, each equipped with a kitchen (stove, refrigerator, sink) so you may choose to bring and prepare your own food, but you must also bring all dishes, pots, pans, cooking utensils, flatware, etc. since these are not provided. You may want to bring snacks and beverages, glassware, mugs, bowls and the like also. Each apartment has a combination tubshower with bedding and towels provided by Huckleberry Heaven.

Ski equipment can be rented from Huckleberry Heaven (826-3405, call early to reserve your size) or Outdoor Rentals in the SUB (885-6170).

There will be a meeting of those wishing to attend this year's ski weekend on Friday, Jan. 23rd at noon at the Women's Center. Please plan to attend this meeting if you want to go to Huckleberry Heaven with us since we'll be discussing the final cost, departure time, who will drive and who will ride, who will bring their own food and who will purchase meals, and who, if anyone, will need to bring sleeping bags, pillows, etc. Mark the trip and the meeting on your calendar! It is not necessary to attend the meeting in order to go on the ski trip, you just have to live with the decisions the group makes. It is also not necessary to ski to enjoy this great week-end.
