COUNSELING CENTER WEEK

ANGER MANAGEMENT - Session I: Anger can be viewed in a variety of ways. In a positive light it has been seen as one type of emotional expression necessary in healthy relationships, as an energizing force in correcting social injustice, or as a precursor to positive assertive behaviors. Anger can also create problems, however. It can have a role in or be a precursor to verbal or physical aggression including child abuse, damaged interpersonal relationships and/or property and physiological distress such as headaches and ulcers. Bob Stark, U of I Counseling Psychologist, will focus on the dynamics of anger, explore various aspects of anger and techniques for managing anger so that it can work for us, rather than against us.

WOMAN'S SPIRITUALITY GROUP IS STILL OPEN: Because last months newsletter took so long to reach community member's mailboxes, the beginning of this group has been delayed. BEIJING STUDENTS MUST SUBMIT REPORTS of their activities during the pro-democracy demonstrations in Tiananmen Square this summer. University officials say the diaries won't be turned over to police, but many students are skeptical. Graduating seniors have also been ordered to take one- or two-week study sessions that focus on how the army "saved" the capital city. (From National On Campus Report Aug. 21, 1989.)
