MUSIC: SPEAKING FROM THE SOUL: Moscow vocalist Susan Hoffius will share songs of peace, songs that speak to the heart, and discuss the power of music in one's life and the meaning music has in her personal life.

January 22 Wednesday

WOMEN OF COLOR: Join us for an interactive discussion with TIAJUANA COCHNAUER, GEORGIA YUAN, MICHELLE WARD and others, addressing the world of women of color. During this week of public awareness of the civil rights movement, inequality and racism, this discussion, through sharing personal experience, offers further insight into our country's political and social development and the realities of the combination of racism and sexism.

January 28 Tuesday

RACISM 101: This documentary program, produced by Frontline, explores the unsettling resurgence on college campuses of the overt racism that flared during the civil rights movement.

February 4 Tuesday

PINK TRIANGLES: A film about prejudice against lesbians and gay men. The film puts current forms of discrimination in historical perspective. Its title is drawn from the Nazi practice of forcing gay inmates of concentration camps to wear pink triangles. This is a highly acclaimed film and rarely available for showing.

February 11 Tuesday

HEALTH CARE SCREENING FOR WOMEN: DR. SUSAN GELLETLY from the UI Student Health Center will discuss health care interventions and screening procedures vital for women's self-care. Dr. Gelletly returns by popular request for another informative and interesting program.

SUSAN B. ANTHONY BIRTHDAY AND VALENTINE'S DAY CELEBRATION: Continuing a time-honored tradition the Women's Center will again host a birthday celebration in honor of this early suffragist born on February 15th, 1820. Join us for punch and cake for Susan B's 172th birthday.

February 18 Tuesday

NEVADA RANCH WOMEN: EVELYNE PICKETT, doctoral candidate in history and author of the forthcoming book, Ladies in the Empty Quarter, will present slides of Nevada ranch women and discuss their work and lifestyles.

WOMEN AND CREATIVITY: This film is part of the "Creativity with Bill Moyers" series and addresses the choices between a life of creativity and raising a family with artists Judy Chicago, Bernie Lasseau and novelist Mary Gordon.

GRACIE PFOST: IDAHO WOMAN OF NOTE: UI History Professor KATHERINE AIKEN presents this program focusing on Gracie Pfost, the only woman to have been elected to represent Idaho in Congress. This remarkable woman held her congressional seat from 1953 to 1963. Throughout her career, she urged women to enter public life and support one another and endure the hard knocks inherent in working for change.

CAN'T KEEP OUR MOUTHS SHUT!: OK, OK. We thought it was curious that *Thelma & Louise* has become known as a "male-bashing" movie among some circles. But we weren't going to say anything about it. We're getting used to accusations of male bashing flying around, especially in conversations about male violence toward women. But there's been a recurring theme in reviews of the Ridley Scott movie that we felt we just couldn't let pass.

For those of you who don't know the film, the two women flee after Louise shoots to death a man who had tried to rape Thelma. Louise explains to Thelma that since many people saw Thelma drunk and dancing and flirting with the guy, the police would not likely believe that there was a rape attempt. Terrence Rafferty of *The New Yorker* (6/3/91) wrote "Louise makes this radical decision, to go on the lam rather than face the skepticism of the authorities, instantaneously and with unanswerable conviction. For the audience, the moment requires a leap of faith that is far greater than the one the cops would have to make in order to believe the women's story."

Would that that were true, Mr. Rafferty. But we're talking real world, here. It is still the case that people in our society (including police, prosecutors and jurors) are more likely to blame and disbelieve the victim if she is drunk, "seductive," or "loose." And Thelma had the appearance of all three! That moment of decision in the film is utterly credible. I wish we lived in a world where Louise's "radical decision," made "instantaneously and with unanswerable conviction," didn't make sense. But today, in virtually any community in the United States, it doesn't even take a tiny hop of faith to understand her. (Beyond The Shadows, Fall 1991)

Please plan to attend this meeting if you want to go to Huckleberry Heaven with us, since we'll be discussing the final cost, departure time, who will drive, and who will bring their own food and who will purchase meals. It is also not necessary to ski to enjoy this great weekend. There's a hot tub and there will be table games (Trivial Pursuit and Pictionary) and, of course, lively conversation and a sharing time for all.

HAPPY BIRTHDAY, SUSAN B. ANTHONY!: Susan B. Anthony was brought up in a household of socially conscious Quakers. She attended her first Women's Rights Convention in Syracuse, New York in 1852; before long, she was completely committed to the feminist cause.

Anthony insisted that she could neither write nor speak from a platform effectively. With a pen in her hand, she complained she felt as clumsy as if "mounted on stilts." She confided in her journal in 1860, "It is a terrible martyrdom for me to speak." Her forte was as an organizer. There was no other woman of her time who was her equal in this respect. From Elizabeth Cady Stanton's memoirs comes this vivid picture of Anthony in the early days of the movement:

"(W)henever I saw the stately Quaker girl coming across my lawn, I knew that some happy convocation of the sons of Adam was to be set by the ears, by one of our appeals or resolutions. The little portmanteau, stuffed with facts, was opened, and there we had...false interpretations of Bible texts, the statistics of women robbed of their property, shut out of some college, half paid for their work, the reports of some disgraceful trial; injustice enough to turn any woman's thoughts from stockings and puddings...Night after night, by an old fashioned fireplace, we plotted and planned the coming agitation; how, when, and where each entering wedge could be driven, by which women might be recognized and their rights secured."

COMPOSER SEEKS SUBMISSIONS: Kay Gardner, a well known women's composer, has been commissioned to write an orchestral/choral work about the cycles of women's lives. The work will be premiered at the 20th National Women's Music Festival in June of 1994.
