UNDERSTANDING PRIVILEGE: THOUGHTS FOR CULTURAL DIVERSITY WEEK

How often are whites unaware of the invisible package of privilege that they take for granted on an everyday basis? The following personal experiences are excerpted from an article by Peggy McIntosh, "Examining Unearned Privilege" from On Campus With Women published by the Assoc. of American Colleges.

- I can, if I wish, arrange to be in the company of people of my own race most of the time.
- I can go shopping alone most of the time, pretty well assured that I will not be followed or harassed.
- I can turn on the television or open to the front page of the paper and see people of my race widely represented.
- I can be sure that my children will be given curricular materials that testify to the existence of their race.
- I can swear, dress in second hand clothes or not answer letters without having people attribute these choices to the bad morals, the poverty or the illiteracy of my race.
- I can do well in challenging situations without being called a credit to my race.
- I can take a job with an affirmative action employer without having coworkers on the job suspect that I got it because of my race.
- I can remain oblivious of the language and customs of persons of color who constitute the world's majority without feeling any penalty for such oblivion in my own culture.
