THE MEDIA: 'WATCH'- OUT In 1992 women achieved some gains in the ballot box. But in the 'Box' women are still watching out for much needed reforms. Television and the news media consistently either ignore or trivialize the issues affecting women every day. Recent findings:

- ♦ Domestic violence results in more emergency room visits each year than muggings, rapes, and car accidents combined. Yet news of this violence is reported alarmingly infrequently.
- ♦ The front pages of 10 large daily newspapers found that 12% of people mentioned in the articles were women and 24% of the photos were of women-usually with a spouse or children.
- ♦ Television shows involving teenage girls reveal representations of girls falling into two categories: 'budding space cadets' or 'aspiring librarians'. Sally Steenland of Wider Opportunities for Women asserts, 'The messages are very clear: you cannot be both smart and pretty. And boys don't like smart girls.'
