Publisher Patricia Goldmann is committed to bringing information about a variety of issues to women throughout the state. She will also feature women throughout the state who are active in different areas that affect women's lives. In addition to the paper, printouts on specific subjects will be available to the public. The idea of a statewide newspaper evolved from Goldmann's work with Mujeres Unidas de Idaho and their newsletter which she created two years ago. She found that many women were interested in the articles about health and wanted more information.

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WOMEN'S HISTORY QUIZ ANSWERS:

- 1. In New York City, 1855, the Woman's Hospital was established by women for women. Known as the 'birthplace of gynecology' it was the first such institution in the world.
- 2. Wilhelmina Cole Holladay is the founder and president of the board of directors of the National Museum of Women in the Arts which opened in Washington, DC in April, 1987.
- 3. Oveta Culp Hobby was the first secretary of Health, Education and Welfare when it was raised to a cabinet position under Pres. Eisenhower in 1953. She was also the first director of the Women's Army Corps (WAC) which was made part of the regular army in 1943.
- 4. "The World Exposition of Women's Progress" opened in Chicago on April 18, 1925. The fair was a panorama of what US women had done in the quarter of a century from 1900-1925.
- 5. Chien-Shiung Wu received the distinguished Comstock Prize in 1964 for her research in the field of subatomic particles.

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
