The Mission of the conference is to develop effective leaders who are catalysts for change and who seek to create a balanced society. The conference is designed to bring women leaders and women emerging as leaders together to promote the qualities women bring to decision-making. The Goal of the conference is to educate, encourage and support women to accept the leadership challenge, to act for the common good, to learn from one another and to affirm the positive qualities women bring to leadership.

The conference is guided by a 53 women Board of Directors from diverse ethnic and racial backgrounds, with more than 400 women volunteering their time and resources. Participants are expected from all over the Northwest including Alaska and British Columbia. A Young Woman's Forum, ages 17-29, is an integral component of the conference.

The following is the Perspective articulated by the conference organizers:

The values and ways that women bring to life and leadership are imperative to spur the enormous changes that will make this world a safer, healthier, and more humane place. Women's qualities, attributes, and creative energies have proven enormously successful in world cultures. In that light, we endorse the following components of women's ways of leading, synthesized in part from The Chalice and the Blade by Riane Eisler and In A Different Voice by Carol Gilligan:

- Recognize that people are the most important factor in any issue.
- Champion the win/win model of living and working which promotes cooperation, collaboration and consensus.
- Encourage self-empowerment, nurturing and self-reliance.
- Emphasize that individual rights and responsibility to one's community are equally important.
- Invest in the next generation by using a long range perspective.
- Practice an interdisciplinary approach to life which values the relationship of mind, body, spirit.

- Resourceful Women, a new publication from Visible Ink Press, \$17.95, contains information about hundreds of organizations, publications, videos, programs, and services targeted toward women, covering many issues such as health, aging, education, global issues, history, sports and recreation, work, youth, booksellers, spirituality, sexuality, politics, and kinship. Short profiles, commentaries, fiction, and poetry accompany each section. The 833 page book can be used for self-help and referral an as a way to track down sometimes hard to find information. Higher education is covered in both the education and work sections.
- Who's Where and Doing What is the title of a new directory published by the National Council for Research on Women. The directory contains nearly forty pages of names of persons who are individual council affiliates, researchers, and staff working at council member centers. In addition to title, address and phone/fax, profession/work and interest/expertise are listed. The 73 page booklet is indexed by state, profession, primary work, and interest/expertise. The publication is available from the National Council for research on Women at 530 Broadway, 10th Floor, New York, NY 10012 for \$8.00. To be included in the directory as an individual affiliate contact the council.
- Common Catalogue is another new directory from the National Council for Research on Women which lists all member centers of the council. Information about the 75 centers includes a description of activities, contact persons, and selected lists of publications. The appendices include a list of centers willing to sell or exchange mailing lists, center publications which accept advertising, geographical indexing by state, type of work, author/administrator, and index of words. The 158 page report will be of help to anyone looking for resources, publications, information, and experts in particular areas. - The Women's Educational Equity Act Publishing Center Catalogue provides materials appropriate for use in both postsecondary and elementary /secondary settings. The resources cover a wide range of information, such as materials for administrators in community colleges, programs for returning women students, career training, materials aimed at those working with women of color, programs for displaced homemakers, and programs for single mothers. - Women Make Movies, Inc. Looking for film and video resources for classes or programs? Women Make Movies can help with their 1994 catalogue which lists approximately 350 films an videos covering a wide range of women's issues, including equity, health, gender, global perspectives, diversity, cultural identity and the arts. A non-profit organization, Women Make Movies is multicultural, multiracial and produces promotes, distributes an exhibits films and videotapes by and about women. It also provides some production assistance and maintains a Women of Color database listing women who make videos and films. - The Complete Handbook for College Women: Making the Most of Your College Experience gives expert advice on being on your own for the first time, staying healthy and safe, living in a diverse environment, getting along with a roommate and assertiveness and conflict resolution. Also included are chapters on alcohol and drugs, eating disorders, sexuality, sexual harassment, and sexual abuse. The book will be of help to college-bound women and students already at school as well as administrators an parents. The 393 page book written by Carol Weinberg is available for \$15.95 from New York University Press, Washington Square, New York, NY 10003.
