There are many excellent and important ideas for programs and the newsletter and we will be working to incorporate as many as possible into the coming year. There was an overwhelming response for programs on health and we will be giving special attention to your suggestions in this area. We especially appreciated the support that many of you expressed for the programs and the Women's Center. Your enthusiasm. commitment and concern for women's issues is a strong incentive for us to continue to provide a safe space for women and men to explore ideas openly and without censorship. Lastly, if you weren't able to return a survey your input and ideas are valued and you are always welcome to come to the Women's Center and meet with Kim Bouchard, the Education Programmer, to share your ideas for future newsletters and programs.

If you didn't receive one and are interested in joining ATHENA and finding out more about the association please call Donna Hanson, Athena Treasurer, at 5-2505. 10 ROOTS OF VIOLENCE: FACTS WE FACE: Fact #1. Every year approximately 1,500 women and girls in the U.S. are killed by male partners or former partners. They range in age from 13 to 82. They represent every class, race and ethnic group.

Fact #2 In the U.S. four million women are beaten by male partners every year.

Fact #3. More than 25% of the women who are victims of domestic violence in the U.S. are beaten while pregnant.

Fact #4. More than three million children witness acts of domestic violence every year.

Fact #5 Every month more than 50,000 U.S. women seek restraining or protection orders.

Fact #6 50% of all homeless women and children are fleeing domestic violence.

Fact #7 There are nearly 1,500 shelters for battered women in the U.S.

Fact #8 In Boston, for every two women and children given access to a shelter, five women and eight children were turned away.

Fact #9 Domestic violence causes roughly 100,000 days of hospitalization, 30,000 emergency room visits, and 40,000 trips to the doctor every year.

Fact #10 If all women victimized by domestic violence in 1993 joined hands, the line would stretch from New York City to Los Angeles and beyond.
