In the course students become informed about the current research, policies and writings. Students then engage in peer education on campus and in the community and become an integral part of a campus wide early warning system that helps protect peers' and classmates' safety in potentially dangerous situations. The course is recommended for majors in health education, secondary education, sociology, psychology and criminal justice. Registration is still open for the class.
