Stride for Gold!

This year at Palousafest, the Women's Center booth celebrated all female medalists at the 1996 Summer Olympics in Atlanta. We were privileged to have Moscow's 1988 Olympic gold medalist, Andrea Lloyd, join us at the booth to autograph visors and give away prizes.

In a contest to guess the number of chocolates contained in a jar, Kendra McPherson was the grand prize winner, walking away with an autographed basketball, donated by Tri-State and signed by Andrea Lloyd. Chris Ricketts won the second place prize, a Dan O'Brien T-shirt. Although many people guessed ONE, despite the heat, the chocolates did not melt together!

Andrea Lloyd was identified as a basketball gem while she played for the Moscow School District and was ultimately recruited away from Moscow to the wellsupported University of Texas women's basketball team. Andrea went on to play professionally in Italy, returning this summer to sign on with the newly-formed professional women's basketball league in the states. Fans can watch her play professionally for the Columbus Quest women's basketball team.

At the UI we have an opportunity to demonstrate the well-deserved support of our own University of Idaho women athletes!

Stride for Gold is the annual fundraiser for women's athletics at the University of Idaho. Participants are asked to raise pledges for one hour of walking or aerobic exercise that takes place at the Kibbie Dome on the morning of Saturday, October 19.

The 1996 goal is to raise \$50,000 for Coach Hilbert's volleyball team, Coach Holt's basketball team, and support for the women's athletic program. These funds are used for recruiting, team travel, and equipment.

There are several options for the Stride for Gold this year:

- You may attend and STRIDE (walking or aerobics) by collecting pledges and checking in at 8:15 a.m.
- You may raise pledges and have a student-athlete designated to STRIDE in your place.
- You may send a tax-deductible check made out to "UI STRIDE FOR GOLD" with your generous contribution.

Supporters who choose to STRIDE receive a FREE general admission ticket to Vandal Volleyball on Saturday, October 19, and are treated to a complimentary brunch.

Moscow Sister City Association

The Moscow Sister City Association needs your support to sponsor Ana Julia Castillo Lopez, from Moscow's sister city, Villa El Carmen, Nicaragua, for a semester of study here at the University of Idaho this January. Ms. Lopez, 30, currently oversees five small, remote rural elementary schools in her position as directrice for Centro Omar Torrijos Herrera.

Born and raised in Villa El Carmen, Lopez has worked in the village schools for the past thirteen years. In the summer of 1994 Moscow Public School French and Spanish teacher, Connie Larson, stayed with Ms. Lopez's family, and many Moscow High School students continue to exchange letters with their Nicaraguan sister city counterparts.

Ms. Lopez teaches evening English classes and attends university classes on the weekends in Managua in addition to her regular employment. The Moscow Sister City Association's support will give her the opportunity to enhance her English language skills and sample other university classes.

- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- 2 Tbsp. chopped onion
- 2 cups cooked rice or noodles
- 1 package frozen peas and carrots
- 2 cups (or more) chicken gravy, bouillon, or soup

Saute celery and onions in a little margarine and add the gravy or stock. Mix in all other ingredients, season or salt to taste, and bake covered in 350 degree oven for 45 minutes.



Orange Pumpkin Holders

Cut the top from a large orange. Scoop out the orange slices. Use the empty orange shell as a holder for a drink or small salad! Decorate the orange with cloves to make a jack-o-lantern face!

October 2 Wednesday FAMILY FOLKLORE *Melynda Huskey* returns to examine the rich variety of folkloric material present in family life by looking at family narratives, proverbs, and jokes. Thomas will review the variety of resources available that include home health care agencies, CNAs, retirement apartments and assisted living. She will also explore the special problem of depression among the elderly. Medicaid eligibility, durable powers of attorney, health and welfare assistance, and other legal and financial considerations will be addressed by Kirsch.
